**Post 1 at Large
Michael Julian Bond**

In 2001 Michael Julian Bond also served as the City Council's President Pro Tempore, in which he presided over Full Council proceedings in the absence of the City Council President, or in the event of a conflict of interest for the sitting president. During his service as the District 3 Councilmember, Bond's legislative accomplishments included:


- (1) Limiting the number of package stores in neighborhoods.
- (2) Renovation of the Washington Park Natatorium.
- (3) Secured \$130 million for the Westside Village on Martin Luther King, Jr. Drive - the largest single investment in the African-American community in the City of Atlanta.
- (4) Authored domestic partner equal benefits legislation for City of Atlanta employees.

Mary Norwood**

For the past twenty years, Mary Norwood has been a welcome and formidable presence in Atlanta and throughout the Southeast, tirelessly working for neighborhood inclusion and a level playing field in city politics.


Mary's civic activities and volunteer history, continuing a family legacy of community involvement, began in the early seventies. She was one of the youngest Vice Presidents of the Junior League of Atlanta and enacted organizational changes which are still in effect today. She established several grassroots organizations that have enjoyed a successful and direct effect on our city.

Andre Dickens**


Andre D. Dickens earned a degree in Chemical Engineering from the Georgia Institute of Technology in 1988. While at Georgia Tech, he held various leadership roles. Positions included: President of the African American Student Union, President of the Diversity Forum, and President of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc. As a result of his outstanding contributions to the University, Andre was also inducted into the ANAK Society - Georgia Tech's highest honor.

Dickens became the youngest person and first African-American to win DSM's prestigious salesperson of the year award in 2002. In 2002, he co-founded City Living Home Furnishings in Atlanta, a family-run operation that grew into a multi-million dollar business with two locations and over 20 employees.



**Felicia A. Moore
District 9**

Council Member Felicia Moore, one of her legislative highlights is the restaurant hygiene law in the major July 2013 Person Reform for the City of Atlanta. Moore is credited by many for bringing the labor union, migrant farm and employee issues together to agree on their increased oversight level to save the District 9 home in April 2004, and which remains later with 500 feet of her home, in 2006, Moore authored legislation to establish the "Matrix Call" alert system that became an Atlanta Police Department Standard Operating Procedure for swift, efficient public alerts to assist in finding missing, mentally impaired persons. In 2009, the law was adopted. Additionally, she brought Project Lifesaver to Atlanta.



**Yolanda Adrean
District 8**

Council member Yolanda Adrean is concerned about how crime diminishes quality of life for all residents as well as visitors. Traveling here for commerce, tourism and business. While the city has decreased violent crime, property crimes are up, and many neighborhoods and businesses are spending exorbitant amounts on private security. Our Public Safety Committee is working with Interim Chief Turner to better align resources to give each neighborhood stimulus money (\$12 million) is being used to hire 50 police for community based policing.




**C.T. Martin
District 10**

Councilman Martin is serving his fourth term as the District 10 representative and has worked to revitalize neighborhoods. He is an Atlanta native and received his Bachelor's degree from Shaw University in Raleigh, N.C., and his master's Social Work from Atlanta University. During his first term, Councilman Martin led the effort to sign the Martin Luther King, Jr. Drive Merchants Association, still serves as a catalyst for much of the growth and development in the area.




**Keisha Lance Bottoms
District 11**

Councilmember Keisha Bottoms has worked with colleagues to achieve the goal of 2,000 officers with the Atlanta Police Force as well as to successfully balance the City's budget each year. During her time on Council, without increasing taxes, she successfully secured the Chair of the Public Safety Committee and has served as Chair of the Council's Zoning Committee. During her term as Vice Chair of the 2013 Transportation Committee, she spearheaded the effort to secure the \$1.2 billion investment at Hartsfield Jackson Airport, making it the busiest airport in the world.

Sheperd holds leadership positions and board appointments at the City of Atlanta. She is the Chair of the Community Development and Human Resources Committee, a member of the Committee on Council and the Public Safety Committee. Sheperd is also a member of the Board of Directors for the Atlanta Beltline Inc., the Board of Directors for the National Center for Civil and Human Rights, and the Board of Directors for the Atlanta-DeKalb County Public Safety Authority. Howard Shook is serving his second term as a member of the Atlanta City Council. He is a member of Christ the King Church.




**Cleta Winslow

District 5**


Council Member Natalyn Mosby's legislative accomplishments include establishing a \$113 million bond in tax revenue, establishing a task force to study the environmental hazards associated with illegal dumping, acquiring more than 30 acres of green space in District 5, legislation directing the City's Chief Financial Officer to provide greater transparency in matters regarding the City's financial standing, as well as legislation establishing a task force to resolve jurisdictional issues involving Atlanta's public safety response. Archibong served as Chair of the City Utilities Committee, a member of the Board of Directors of Atlanta's General Employees Pension Fund, a member of the 2013 Class of Leadership Atlanta, trustee of the Atlanta-Highland Public Library System, and Board member, East Lake YMCA.



**Carla Smith
District 1**

Carla Smith landed in Atlanta she immediately got involved in her community, which at the time was slowly transitioning from a community of vacant and abandoned homes, drugs and other criminal activity to a very diverse community of families, singles, homeowners and renters. Attorney Cesar C. Mitchell serves as 7th President of the Atlanta City Council. Prior to being elected Council President, Mitchell served eight years as a citywide Councilmember. As a public official, Mitchell advocates for safer communities through specific initiatives including police foot patrols. He has championed key legislation facilitating economic revitalization in underdeveloped areas by authoring measures to create 4 of the city's 10 Tax Allocation Districts and supporting legislation for community input in the Beltline Project.

Council President Mitchell is a native Atlanta, educated at Morehouse College and the University of Georgia Law. He currently practices commercial real estate and finance at the global firm, DLA Piper. He and his wife, Dr. Tiffany Mitchell are the proud parents of two young daughters. They reside in the Historic West End community and attend Impact United Methodist Church.




**Kwanza Hall
District 2**

Council Member Kwanza Hall has been recognized for his leadership in many areas. In 2013, the W.K. Kellogg Foundation recognized his "Way of Leadership" initiative to improve public safety and expand opportunities for families along District 2's Boulevard corridor. In 2012, Georgia State University awarded him with the Pioneer Award, its highest recognition for leadership, promoting a positive culture in downtown Atlanta. In 2011, Atlanta's Park Prize honored him for governmental leadership in parks and green space advocacy. He was named by an independent media panel as one of the 100 Most Influential Atlantans, and Atlanta's American Institute of Architects chapter created the Kwanza Hall Award for civic leadership in 2009. Creative leadership named him Atlanta's "Most Influential Figure." In 2008, he was named one of Georgia Trend magazine's "40 Under 40."



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
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
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
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
