GENERAL

1. Welcome

Dan Reuter, ARC, welcomed attendees and called the meeting to order. Susie Dunn, ARC, requested that TCC members review the 8/6/10 TCC meeting summary and provide any comments to her. Dunn announced that during September, ARC will hold meetings with every jurisdiction to discuss transportation project selection and evaluation. TCC members should expect to hear from staff regarding this matter soon.

2. Public Comment Period - No public comment.

3. Plan 2040 and UGPM Framework

Reuter gave an introductory presentation on the Unified Growth Policy Map (UPGM) component of *Plan 2040*. Reuter explained that over the next three months, additional TCC / LUCC work sessions will be held to ensure that Georgia Regional Planning Rules are satisfied as *Plan 2040* development continues. For this meeting, the focus was on development of strategies and implementation measures which support the UGPM. In terms of the overall Plan 2040 schedule, the Regional Assessment, the Stakeholder Involvement Program and the Regional Resource Plan components are complete. Work in progress includes updating the 20-county UGPM, completing the Regional Transportation Plan, the Legal Review and the Implementation Plan. Work tasks should be complete by Spring 2011 with adoption of the Regional Transportation Plan in July. To develop the latest UGPM, land development maps from the 10 county region were aggregated into a single map with a common land classification system. Due to the context in which the source maps were created, the end result is not very useful as a basis to develop the UGPM. Instead, staff focused on creating a map that reflected the places and areas that are important to the region, while taking care to include recent planning efforts, such the Concept 3 transit plan or local LCI plans.

Reuter then listed the five main regions of the UGPM:

- Regional Core and Employment Areas encompasses 39% of the region's jobs, 6% of the region's population and 3% of its land. Most of this area either possesses or has plans to implement high capacity transit service.
- <u>Maturing Neighborhoods</u> constitutes the region's urbanized area before 1970. Together with the Regional Core and Employment Areas, it holds 56% of the region's jobs and 28% of the region's population. Future development here consists mostly of redevelopment due to the scarcity of undeveloped land.
- <u>Established Suburbs</u> were built mostly between 1970 and 1995. Established Suburbs, Maturing Neighborhoods and the Regional Core and Employment Areas together hold 77% of the region's jobs and 60% of the population. Transit service is relatively sparse.
- <u>Developing Suburbs</u>, along with the previously mentioned regions, contain 96% of the region's jobs and 87% of its population. As with Established Suburbs, Developing Suburbs generally have little access to transit.
- <u>Developing Rural and Rural</u> contain nearly 51% of the region's land but only 4% of the region's jobs and 13% of the region's population.

Orr then summarized the presentation by stating that staff now needs implementation strategies from TCC/LUCC to help make sure the UPGM is followed. He reminded attendees that ARC cannot implement a regional plan without local support and assistance. Developing the UGPM is meant to help local jurisdictions implement their development visions and for ARC to collectively weave those local visions into a regional development policy.

WORK SESSION

At this point, breakout sessions were held at numerous tables to allow TCC and LUCC members to provide feedback and advice on UPGM implementation strategies. Input will be summarized and discussed with the group at future meetings.
